

Criminology Major - Bachelor of Science (BS)

Criminology is the scientific study of crime and criminal behavior. The discipline of Criminology understands criminal behavior through the lens of the social sciences, particularly sociology, asserting that crime and criminal behavior is influenced by the social world. Further, criminologists advocate that identifying the structural roots of criminality is key to effectively addressing the behavior. Using a community-centered approach, the Criminology degree at UWL provides students with in-depth education on criminal behavior and its ties to factors such as poverty, discrimination, trauma, mental illness, and substance use disorders. The program prepares students to assess and engage both criminal justice institutions and other community organizations, to interpret current research on crime, and to effectively apply research findings as they engage with clients and organizations throughout a community.

Students in the program will acquire practical experience in applying their knowledge and skills to support a broad array of community members and be prepared to apply their degree in areas both inside and outside of the criminal justice system. Both the required and elective courses in the curriculum will make heavy use of experiences such as undergraduate course-embedded research, collaborative assignments and projects, community-based learning, and extensive writing. Students will gain hands-on experience with community partners not only through internships, but also through course-embedded research and community-engaged learning projects.

Every Criminology major completes a senior project in one of the three senior capstone courses: SOC 405 Quantitative Social Research, SOC 416 Qualitative Explorations, or CRIM 422 Criminology Seminar. Working closely with faculty, each student designs and completes a semester-long investigation of a criminology related topic. The senior capstone course provides students with firsthand experience and analytical skills that are valuable in the work world and in graduate study.

¹ To enroll in SOC 200 Foundations of Social Analysis and SOC 250 Methods of Social Research I, a student must have declared criminology or sociology as a major. Once a student has declared criminology or sociology as a major, a minimum of four semesters is needed to complete the required core course sequence.

² Electives should be selected in consultation with a faculty advisor.

Double majors in criminology & sociology:

- Double majors in criminology and sociology may only count SOC 110 or CRIM 115, SOC 200, SOC 250, SOC 350 and either SOC 405, SOC 416, or CRIM 422 towards the completion of the criminology major.
- Double majors in sociology and criminology may not count CRIM 322 as an elective for the sociology major.
- Only six credits of elective courses taken for the sociology major may be applied to the criminology major.
- Students double majoring in criminology and sociology may **not** earn a minor in criminal justice.

Criminology majors with criminal justice minors:

- Only CRIM 324 and three additional credits taken for the criminal justice minor may be applied to the criminology major.

Degree requirements

All students must complete the general education, college core, major/minor, and university degree requirements to qualify for a degree. All enrolled students have access to a degree audit to track all of these requirements.

College of Arts, Social Sciences, and Humanities (CASSH/VPA) Bachelor of Science core requirements

The college core provides opportunities for students to deepen their knowledge by taking courses in the arts, humanities, social sciences, and/or sciences beyond the Core General Education Requirements (CGER). Students may select from courses offered by the full range of academic departments within the college according to their interests. The college core allows students to build their critical thinking, communication, problem solving, teamwork, and global competencies through in-depth exploration of topics of their choosing.

The following conditions apply:

1. Students majoring in English (writing and rhetoric or literary and cultural studies emphases only) or in the Department of Global

Cultures and Languages must earn a Bachelor of Arts degree.

Teacher education majors earn a Bachelor of Science degree and follow the School of Education core. Students majoring in other CASSH programs may choose either a B.A. or a B.S. degree.

2. Courses completed for the college core cannot overlap with CGER or the student's first major except where otherwise stated. The college core is in addition to those degree requirements. Overlap with a second major, minor, or certificate is allowed.
3. Courses approved for use in the college core:

Diversity course requirement

All students in CASSH must complete at least one diversity course from within CASSH. This course can overlap with CGER, major, minor, or other degree requirements. Select from the 100-400 level in ANT, ARC, CHI, CRIM, FRE, GCL, GER, HCK, HMG, JPN, RUS, SOC, SPA, or RGS; or from the following:

Bachelor of Science course requirement

Bachelor of Science students complete four courses as follows:

1. A lab science course from:

2. An approved college core social science course; and
 3. An additional course from the previously listed lab sciences, college core social science, or a qualitative course from: CS 101, CS 115, CS 120, CT 100, FIN 207, MTH 115, MTH 116, MTH 123, MTH 150, MTH 151, MTH 160, MTH 175, MTH 207, MTH 208, MTH 215, MTH 216, STAT 145, STAT 245; and
 4. One course from the college core fine arts or humanities categories.

Second major, minor, certificates, or individualized option requirement

In addition to all other College of Arts, Social Sciences, and Humanities core requirements, all students in CASSH must complete one of the following:

1. Complete a second major outside of the student's major program; or
2. Complete a minor outside of the student's major program, consisting of at least 18 credits; or
3. Complete two certificates outside of the student's major program with at least 12 combined credits at the 300/400-level; or
4. Complete an individualized option, consisting of 18 credits that are in addition to the minimum credits required in the CGER. At least 12 credits must be earned at the 300/400-level outside the major department. The remaining six credits may consist of:
 - a. 100-level or higher courses outside the major; or
 - b. 300/400-level courses inside the major department not being used to fulfill major requirements.

Baccalaureate degree requirements

Candidates for the Bachelor of Arts or the Bachelor of Science degrees must accomplish the following:

1. Fulfill the Core General Education Requirements (CGER) (<https://catalog.uwlax.edu/undergraduate/generaleducation/#generaleducationrequirements>).
2. Complete the courses prescribed by the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee for the degree desired in the respective school or college.
3. Earn a minimum of 120 semester credits with at least a 2.00 cumulative GPA.^{1,2}
4. At least 40 credits must be earned in 300/400 level courses. Transfer courses earned or transferred at the 300/400 level apply to this requirement.
5. Complete major and minor requirements with at least a 2.00 GPA^{1,2} in each major and minor (and concentration or emphasis, if selected).
6. A minimum of 30 semester credits in residence at UWL is required for graduation. (See undergraduate resident requirement (<https://catalog.uwlax.edu/undergraduate/academicpolicies/graduation/#undergraduate-residence-requirement>)).
7. Submit an application for graduation via the "Submit Intent to Graduate" link in the WINGS Student Center as soon as the student has registered for his or her final semester or summer term in residence. December and winter intersession graduates should apply by May 1. May and summer graduates should apply by December 1.
